KARACHI, March 27:—The Chief Martial Law Administrator today promulgated the Martial Law Regulations—76 and 77.

The Regulations relate to ban on political activities and censorship on the Press.

The following Martial Law Regulation was promulgated in Karachi yesterday by the Chief Martial Law Administrator, Pakistan:

Martial Law Regulation by Chief Martial Law Administrator, Pakistan, Regulation No. 76:

1. No person shall organise or convene any meeting, nor being a religious congregation in a public place, or organise or take out a demonstration or a procession, not being a religious, funeral or marriage procession.

2. No person shall attend or otherwise take part in any meeting, demonstration or a procession organised or convened or taken out in contravention of paragraph 1 of this Regulation.

Explanation: For the purpose of this Regulation "public place" includes:

(a) Any educational institution, mill, factory workshop, hospital, club and any other place to which public has access whether on payment or otherwise

(b) Any tent, enclosure or other structure of temporary nature erected or constructed for the purpose of demonstration or a meeting; and

(c) Any enclosure or compound whether forming part of a building or not which is not covered by a roof.

3. Martial Law Regulation Nos. 60 and 61, issued by the Chief Martial Law Administrator, are hereby cancelled.

Maximum punishment 6 years' rigorous imprisonment.

The following Martial Law Regulation was promulgated in Karachi yesterday by the Chief Martial Law Administrator, Pakistan:

Martial Law Regulation by Chief Martial Law Administrator, Pakistan Regulation No. 77:

1. No person shall print or publish or cause to be printed or published in a newspaper or other document whatever, any matter which—

(a) Tends directly or indirectly, or is calculated to prejudicially affect the integrity or the solidarity of Pakistan; or

(b) Tends directly or indirectly to criticise the imposition or continuance of Martial Law; or

(c) Tends directly or indirectly or is calculated to create alarm or despondency amongst the public; or

(d) Tends directly or indirectly or calculated to create dissatisfaction towards the Armed Forces, the Police and the Government or any member thereof; or

(e) Tends directly or indirectly, or is calculated to create or excite feelings of animosity, ill-will or hatred between communities, sects, classes or sections of the citizens of Pakistan; or

(f) Tends directly or indirectly to be offensive to the religion of Islam; or

(g) Tends directly to be disrespectful to the Quaid-i-Azam.

2. No person shall print, or publish, or cause to be printed, or published in a newspaper

or other document whatever, any matter which—

(a) Tends directly or indirectly to create hatred or ill-will towards any political party in Pakistan or any leader or member thereof; or

(b) Tends directly or indirectly, or is likely to cause agitation, excitement, alarm or despondency amongst the public on any political issue without first submitting such matter for scrutiny to an authority appointed in this behalf by a Provincial Government and obtaining clearance from the said authority.

3. The words "or written" and the words "or in writing" shall be omitted from the Martial Law Regulation Nos. 6, 17 and 19 respectively, issued by the Chief Martial Law Administrator.

4. Martial Law Regulation No. 51 issued by the Chief Martial Law Administrator, is hereby repealed.

5. Anyone who contravenes this Regulation shall be punishable, Maximum punishment 7 years' rigorous imprisonment.

Arab teams not to play against Israel

BANGKOK, Mar. 26:—Arab teams from Arab countries shall not play in any match, including the final, against Israel in the Fourth Asian Champion Clubs Football tournament, currently held here the President of Kuwait Football Association said today.

Mr. Ahmed Alsaadeon the President and under-secretary of the Kuwait Ministry of posts, Telegraph and Telephone told Reuters that Kuwait had no relations whatsoever with Israel.

"We have made it clear at the Congress of the International Football Federation (FIFA) held in Mexico City last year as well as the conference of the Asian Football Confederation (AFC) in Bangkok last December that we

football teams from Arab countries shall meet any team from the so-called Israel". Mr. Alsaadeon said.

"We have asked both FIFA and A.F.C. to take this stand into their consideration in grouping football matches for the Olympic Games or the World Cup or for any other tournament" he added.

"We shall not meet the team of the so-called Israel at any stage of the present tournament."

The Al-Arabi which defeated Perak of Malaysia 3-0 last Wednesday meets defending champion Taj of Iran in their second match in group "A" tonight.
