



## CMIA Premulgates M.L.R. 76 and 77

KARACHI, March 27.—The Chief Martial Law Administrator today promulgated the Martial Law Regulations 76 and 77.

The Regulations relate to basic political activities and cohesiveness on the Press.

The following Martial Law Regulation was promulgated in Karachi yesterday by the Chief Martial Law Administrator, Pakistan:

Martial Law Regulation by Chief Martial Law Administrator, Pakistan. Regulation No. 76:

1. No person shall organize or convene any meeting, procession, funeral or marriage procession.

2. No person shall attend or otherwise take part in any meeting, demonstration or a procession organized or convened or taken out in contravention of paragraph 1 of this Regulation.

Explanation: For the purpose of this Regulation "public place" includes:

(a) Any educational institution, mill, factory, workshop, hospital, club and any other place to which public has access whether on payment or otherwise;

(b) Any tent, enclosure or other structure of temporary nature erected or constructed for the purpose of demonstration or a meeting; and

(c) Any enclosure or compound whether forming part of a building or not which is not covered by a roof.

3. Martial Law Regulation Nos. 60 and 61, issued by the Chief Martial Law Administrator, are hereby cancelled.

Maximum punishment is 6 years rigorous imprisonment.

Martial Law Regulation by Chief Martial Law Administrator, Pakistan. Regulation No. 77:

KARACHI, Mar. 27.—Sagging tendency gained fresh momentum on the Karachi Stock Exchange yesterday and a vicious selling spree equaled what has been seen in the past on the cash counter.

Speculative issues on the forward counter also continued to acquire undue tightness in clutch and in profit-taking showing no mercy they ran deeper into deficit.

In the absence of any hope for the better, the market got off with no extension of previous fallings and as selling pressure continued unabated declines were noted on a scattered range. Not only second-line were subjected to loss sales but also almost all popular and sound scrips came in for fresh selling.

On the other hand, only a negligible few scrips man-

1. No person shall print or publish or cause to be printed or published in a newspaper or other document whatever, any matter which—

(a) Tends directly or indirectly to create hatred or ill-will towards any political party in Pakistan or any leader or member thereof; or

(b) Tends directly or indirectly to cause sedition, or is likely to cause sedition, excitement, alarm or disorder amongst the public on any political issue without first submitting such matter for scrutiny to an authority appointed in this behalf by a Provincial Government and obtaining clearance from the said authority.

(c) Tends directly or indirectly to create or calculate to create alarm or disquiet amongst the public; or

(d) Tends directly or indirectly to create or calculate to create dissatisfaction towards the Armed Forces, the Police and the Government or any member thereof; or

(e) Tends directly or indirectly to create or calculate to create or excite feelings of enmity, ill-will or hatred between communities, sects, classes or sections of the citizens of Pakistan; or

(f) Tends directly or indirectly to be offensive to the religion of Islam; or

(g) Tends directly to be disrespectful to the Quaid-i-Azam.

2. No person shall print, or publish or cause to be printed, or published in a newspaper

or other document whatever, any matter which—

(a) Tends directly or indirectly to create or calculate to create alarm or disquiet amongst the public; or

(b) Tends directly or indirectly to create or calculate to create or excite feelings of enmity, ill-will or hatred between communities, sects, classes or sections of the citizens of Pakistan; or

(c) Tends directly to be disrespectful to the Quaid-i-Azam.

3. The words "or written" and the words "or in writing" shall be omitted from the Martial Law Regulation Nos. 6, 17 and 19 respectively, issued by the Chief Martial Law Administrator.

4. Martial Law Regulation No. 51 issued by the Chief Martial Law Administrator, is hereby repealed.

5. Anyone who contravenes this Regulation shall be punishable, Maximum punishment 7 years rigorous imprisonment.

## Students clash

ANKARA, Mar. 26.—Students hurling bombs and firing pistols fought a series of clashes with police today in Turkey's first violence since the issue of martial law.

Police said leftist militant students turned on police stationed on campus after University administrators said a firm "no" to their demand for a political meeting.

They opened fire from dormitory rooftops and hurled bombs at the police below, a spokesman said. Less than 15 minutes later rioting students, who supported Turkey's role as NATO's eastern Mediterranean bulwark as vehemently as the leftists oppose it, opened fire on the leftists from their roof.

The policeman was reportedly wounded when a mortar opened fire on police who wanted to search the Academy of Fine Arts for hidden armaments.

There students in possession of firearms were arrested.

The authorities said that the University was being closed to prevent clashes between rival groups of students.—DAWN
