Mujib sets up govt in E. Pak

NEW DELHI, Sun. — Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's supporters today formed a provisional government in East Pakistan and appealed to other countries to extend immediate recognition, a clandestine radio broadcast reported.

The broadcast, monitored by Indian sources, said a Major Zia Khan had been appointed temporary head of the new government of Bangla Desh (Bengali nation) "under the leadership of Sheikh Mujibur Rahman."

Major Zia had been identified in clandestine radio reports last night as the head of the liberation army of the Sheikh's Awami League.

The radio did not give any explanation why Major Zia had been appointed the de facto leader of the provisional government instead of Sheikh Mujibur.

The Pakistan government radio network has insisted the 57-year-old Sheikh was arrested but his supporters claimed he was still free.

The latest clandestine broadcast, according to United News of India, said Sheikh Mujib was at the "revolutionary headquarters."

Although no location for the headquarters was given, earlier broadcasts said it had been set up in the port city of Chittagong.

The broadcast, according to the Indian agency, also said a liberation force was marching from Chittagong to Dacca — a distance of 125 miles.

The clandestine radio — which describes itself as the "Voice of Independent Bangla Desh" — became the subject of an international dispute today between India and Pakistan.

The Pakistan government, said in a "strong protest" made to the Indian Foreign Ministry, said the radio's transmitter was actually located in an Indian ship at the mouth of the Hooghly river near Calcutta.

An Indian Foreign Ministry spokesman said all of the

accusations were rejected outright when they were presented.

Dacca radio meanwhile reported today that the martial law authorities in East Pakistan had asked for troop reinforcements from the west.

The radio, monitored in Calcutta by the Press Trust of India also said that several thousand West Pakistani troops had been airlifted to Chittagong, the main port in the east, to deal with disturbances.

In Washington Secretary of State William P. Rogers said real economic development of the south Asian subcontinent could occur only if India and Pakistan resolve the Kashmir problem.

EX-USD WORKER SLAIN

Egypt set for bloody Israel war

CAIRO, Sun. — The Egyptian Air Force is on the stations alert and ready for a "ferocious and bloody" war with Israel, Egyptian sources said here today.

Cairo newspapers, which are unable to reflect official news, quoted the sources as saying the Air Force was ready to "face any emergency" along the war with Israel.

His latest news on Egypt's preparedness came as President Anwar Sadat held talks in Cairo on the Middle East with Sudanese leader Jaafar el-Nimeiry.

Two well-informed papers said Egypt's young pilots were having round-the-clock training on the most sophisticated scientific and technological equipment. — Reuter
